Rector's Letter

Dear Friends:

Following is my attempt to summarize the outstanding work of the St. Paul's Outreach Visioning Team.

During the last 5 months this team of Bill Holmes, Dan Loughlin, Dave Mackie, the Rev. Sarah Phelps, Anne Pilgrim, Tad Richard, Kevin Swann, and Aleta McClenney, has worked towards a goal of providing St. Paul's with a deeper, broader, richer sense of how we might live out our call as Christians to extend our faith beyond the pew on Sundays and to work, in service, with those whom Jesus blessed and whom we are called to love as we love ourselves. Information collected through adult education, surveys, listening circles, and one-on-one conversations falls into three broad categories: Philosophical, Financial, and Structural.

PHILOSOPHICAL: Three main themes emerged. 1. Local, hands-on, and relational. While not excluding work beyond the Triangle, parishioners expressed a strong desire for hands on, relational work in our community. 2. Focused on hunger, housing, and "vulnerable populations", including children, elderly, those with mental illness, veterans, farm workers, and recent immigrants. 3. Communicated in a variety of ways. Examples suggested were "outreach only" e-mail blasts, inserts, presentations by outside organizations, and a focus every four months on a particular area identified above. Further, opportunities and successes could be highlighted in homilies, regular outreach-specific announcements, and adult ed.

FINANCIAL: 1. Fundraising: There has been a commitment to outreach through fundraisers such as the Festival of the Arts and Lobster Fest and those who make these possible are to be commended. But there was expressed a desire that parish leadership commit some budgetary level of funding to outreach so that fundraisers are not the sole source, but rather a supplement, to outreach. 2. Reliability: A desire to improve confidence in the leadership that outreach is a parish priority.

STRUCTURAL: 1. Operational: The present outreach committee, representative of the various ministries that currently are a part of who we are as a parish, is invaluable. 2. Strategic: A new strategic outreach committee of 9-12 people could take responsibility for the overall vision of outreach including long-term planning, consideration, and development of new ministries, issues of finance, etc.

The report was recently presented to the vestry, and it is our prayer that the information will provide some direction to our parish leadership and parishioners as we take our next steps forward – thankful for so much good that has been done and mindful of so much more that can be accomplished. 





Lobster Fest Recap

Should we hope / pray for rain next vear?!!

Yes, it rained for the first time in our nine years of Lobster Fest, but YOU, our "Rain Saint" volunteers, responded with

cheerfulness and smiles as you assisted our guests with the caring and efficiency that have become hallmarks of St. Paul's Lobster Fests. Going into the weekend, we were unsure of what turnout (walk-ups) to expect on a rainy day but we brought in almost 400 lobsters above our confirmed number, and ingredients to make about 275 more Lobster Rolls above pre-orders. We sold out within about an hour after we opened, and (unfortunately) had

to turn away a whole "wharf-full" of folks who arrived without confirmed orders hoping to purchase as walk-ups. Now that we know people will brave the rain for our delicious Lobsters and Rolls we'll be more aggressive in ordering next year.

Sales of almost 1,600 Lobsters and about 1.050 Lobster Rolls were records

> (that's more than 2,500 folks eating lobster items via St. Paul's), and our "profit" should be around \$17,000. Part of that amount will remain in the Men's Group Funds for emergency projects around the church, but the majority will be divided

among outreach

needs, vouth activities. and unfunded St. Paul's projects, as determined by the vestry and Men's Group.

Each Lobster Fest seems to become the "best ever" as the teams of volunteers grow both in numbers and expertise. We heard countless complimentary comments from guests as they departed, and


VBS-2016: Two Options!



Crazy Christians, A Call to Follow Jesus

Adult Education Book of the Month November 2015

The St. Paul's Adult Education Committee is introducing a new resource, the selection of a book each month which we hope will be meaningful to parishioners in their spiritual journey. Our first selection is in honor and appreciation of Bishop Michael B. Curry, who will be installed November 1 as the 27th Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. Crazy Christians, A Call to Follow Jesus, is a collection of his essays, most of which began as sermons or addresses he preached or delivered over twelve years to the Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina.

"What does it mean to be a Christian in the 21st century?" The Most Reverend Dr. Katharine Jefferts Schori asks that question in her Foreword to *Crazy Christians* and invites us to "Read and savor these chapters – read them aloud, even, for their cadences teach as much as the words on the page – read, recite, and sing, too, for the hymnody here will enter your bones and help to transform your heart into the vulnerability and compassion of Jesus." One reviewer wrote: "Filled with wisdom, humor, and insight, *Crazy Christians* is one of the finest introductions to the great breadth of Christian faith I've ever come across."

Bishop Curry is also the author of *Songs My Grandma Sang*, in which he shares the music of his childhood, songs that have grown with him to shape his faith.

St. Nicholas is coming to St. Paul's!

St. Nicholas is coming!

Letters have been delivered to the six agencies that we serve: Thompson Child & Family Focus (formerly known as Thompson Children's Home), CommWell Health in Newton Grove, West Haven Housing Ministry, The Healing Place, The Carying Place, and PLM-Families Together. We received about 450 names from these organizations, with the largest number of names coming from CommWell Health. Thompson does not identify individual children but gives us categories of items that they can use in caring for the children.

- We began the St. Nicholas ministry in the early 1980s to provide Christmas presents for the children at the Thompson's Children's Home, an Episcopal-sponsored orphanage located in Charlotte, NC. Back then, Thompson gave us the names of the children with a wish list for each child. We published the list, and people brought gifts...lots of gifts. It was clear that St. Paul's could serve another agency.
- At the time, St. Paul's was actively involved in our Diocese's nascent Episcopal Farmworker Ministry (EFwM), providing clothing and support services weekly to migrant farmworkers in Newton Grove. The EFwM program was located at the TriCounty Health Center, a migrant health program operated by the local county health departments and funded by the federal government to provide health care to migrant farmworkers. Since then, TriCounty has expanded its services and changed its name to CommWell Health, but it is still a community-governed and communityowned organization that provides health care to seasonal farmworkers in Eastern NC. Our diocese has since established a permanent EFwM facility, El Centro Episcopal, next door to the Tri-County health facility to minister to and to serve seasonal farmworkers better. St. Paul's has supported the Episcopal Farmworker Ministry from its inception in the early '80s, and the Advent Tree was created to accommodate the larger number of names that came about by adding the

children of seasonal farmworkers to our St. Nicholas list. We still continue to get many children's names from CommWell Health.

- In 2001, we added children from the Episcopal Housing Ministry (EHM) (now known as West Haven Housing Ministry) to the St. Nicholas list. EHM was a St. Paul's- and Diocesan-sponsored initiative to provide low-income, safe, housing for the working poor in Wake County. It has now been turned over to a private agent, West Haven, to manage.
- The next year, we included children identified by the Healing Place in Raleigh. These gifts go to the children of clients recovering from substance abuse.
- The Carying Place (added in 2008) and PLM-Families Together (added in 2010) provide housing and jobcounseling for the homeless in Cary and Wake County.

Two agencies do not want us to wrap the gifts that we collect for them – Thompson Child & Family Focus and the Healing Place. Since 2004, the gifts to Thompson are actually not Christmas gifts – they are items that the agency can use throughout the year, so the counselors need to be able to see what the gift is. The Healing Place asks its recovering clients to wrap the gifts for their children themselves. This way, they know what they are giving.

Again this year, we have, in some cases, tied together tags for a single family. These bundled tags will be held by the St. Nicholas figure that will be standing on the counter by the tree. If you are inclined to make purchases for an entire family, please look for these bundled tags.

December 6th is the Sunday this year to bring your gifts and present them to St. Nicholas! If you are unable to attend services on this day, please deliver your gifts to the office BEFORE then so they will reach these wonderful children on time. Presents received after noon on December 6th will not get to the child this

Heifer at Christmas

Heifer International is a non-profit organization that sends livestock and training to poor families around the world, providing them with a sustainable source of food and income. Agricultural products from the animals, such as eggs, milk, and honey, can also be sold or traded to provide sustainable income that in turn can help communities build schools, create agricultural cooperatives, and fund small businesses. Each family that receives an animal then "passes on the gift." They give the first female offspring to another family and share the training they received. For 70 years, Heifer International has worked in 125 countries and helped 22.6 million families move out of poverty. Heifer's goal is to continue to help struggling families achieve self-reliance.

At St. Paul's, we have the opportunity to donate to Heifer International every Sunday morning during worship services. Parishioners and visitors can place donations in a small Heifer Ark during the Offertory to celebrate special times, places, and people in their lives. Christmas time offers St. Paul's a special opportunity to give Christmas gifts to our family members and friends in the form of Heifer donations. Parishioners can

make donations via cash or check (made out to "St. Paul's Church" with Heifer International in the memo line), and

place them in the Heifer Ark on Sunday mornings or mail them to the church office. For each donation of \$10, parishioners can send a Heifer greeting card to their



loved ones describing the gift that has been given in their honor. Heifer gift cards will be available in the church narthex between Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Our annual goal for St. Paul's is to donate \$5000, which will buy a Heifer Gift Ark. The Ark includes two water buffalo, two cows, two pigs, two sheep, two goats, plus bees, rabbits, chickens, and more pairs of animals. Heifer sends the Gift Ark animals wherever they are needed to fight hunger and poverty. Thank you for reaching out to help others in need this Christmas. Your gifts to Heifer International are most gratefully received.


