The importance of our Memorial Garden

- ▶ A place where we can have confidence that our remains and those of our families will be cared for in a loving, respectful and dignified manner by members of our own community
- A tranquil place for remembering the loved ones who are no longer with us
- A symbol of the connection of the church to our lives from cradle to death and beyond
- ► A tangible reminder of those who came before us at St. Paul's and who had a hand in making the parish our church home

The need for expansion

- Capacity in our Memorial Garden is limited
 - Including reservations, there is only room for 4 additional names on our markers
 - ▶ At the *current* rate, no additional plots will remain in 10-15 years
- We expect demand to increase
 - ► The trend in the US, and even more so in the Episcopal Church, is toward cremation instead of burial
 - Our parish is now considerably larger than when the original Memorial Garden was dedicated in 1994
 - More of St. Paul's parishioners are choosing this option
 - In our Garden's first 18 years, there were 37 interments
 - From Jan '12 Aug '13, there were 14 interments
 - An additional 30 plots are reserved through prepayment

The need for expansion, cont'd

- The Memorial Garden Committee has explored many options for long-term expansion
- ► The Committee has visited more than 14 churches and one YMCA in the Triangle and beyond to understand more fully how these churches are addressing similar issues
- Several findings include:
 - ▶ Parishioners have different preferences about the ultimate state of their cremated remains.
 - An increasing trend is above-ground <u>inurnment</u> in a <u>columbarium</u>

Vision

- Meet the needs of the parish for many decades into the future
- Provide our parishioners with options
 - Interment in existing garden (new markers effectively expand our capacity)
 - Inurnment in a new Columbarium
 - ► Honoring relatives whose remains are elsewhere by placing a plaque on a Remembrance Wall
- Beautify the Memorial Garden area so that it continues to be a peaceful, contemplative, and spiritual place
- Provide this service at a price that is affordable and competitive with other options, while at the same time being selfsupporting, covering future maintenance, upkeep and expansion costs

Columbariums 101

- What is inurnment and how is it different than interment?
 - Interment is either traditional burial or the burial of cremated remains
 - Inurnment involves storage of an urn (container for cremated remains)
- What is a columbarium?
 - ► A columbarium is an above ground structure in which urns are stored, usually permanently
- Are columbariums new?
 - While more common in big cities with space limitations, columbariums are becoming more popular as cremation increases
 - The Memorial Garden Committee visited columbariums at many churches of various denominations in the area

- What are the advantages of inurnment in a columbarium?
 - ► A columbarium provides surviving family and friends with a tranquil place where they may visit, pray and meditate with their loved one
 - Inurnment provides flexibility: if a family moves and wants their loved ones nearby, individual urns can be relocated
 - Average burial costs for two people typically are more than \$20,000. Cremation costs for two (\$1,500-\$5,000) and the cost of a 2-urn niche (~\$2,000) are far less



YMCA of the Rockies

- Urns are placed in niches in the columbarium wall
- Each niche holds two urns
- A faceplate of metal or granite is engraved with the names of those inurned
- We have selected Homecoming Inc. as our vendor for the columbarium walls, internal hardware and niches/faceplates
- ► Homecoming has an excellent reputation and has been in the columbarium business for 38 years, serving more than 1,200 churches nationwide


Niche with 2-urn capacity



Faceplate engraving options

Expansion plan

- Landscape architects with Stewart Engineering of Raleigh have worked with the Memorial Garden Committee to develop an expansion plan
- ► The plan includes:
 - ► Four markers that will effectively expand the capacity of the existing Memorial Garden by 80 names
 - A columbarium and surrounding landscaping that provide a peaceful setting
 - ► Eventual capacity is 300 niches
 - ► The first phase involves construction of one large and two smaller columbarium walls, with hardware for installation of 90 niches in the large wall
 - When we need additional capacity, we can purchase additional hardware for as many as 210 additional niches
 - A Remembrance Wall for plaques of loved ones whose remains are elsewhere.




Saint Paul's Episcopal Church | Columbarium

Probable cost

- The landscape architect is preparing the final design, after which we will have a better idea of the final cost
- Early estimates:
 - ► Total cost: \$120,000

Of which:

- Markers \$12,000 (\$3,000 each)
- ► Hardware for 90 niches \$21,000
- ► Columbarium construction \$60,000
- ► Landscaping \$10,000
- ► Improved watering system \$2,000
- ► Construction design/management \$15,000

Timing

- We are currently taking reservations for the Memorial Garden and will begin taking reservations in November for the Columbarium
- After we know how many reservations we have, we can identify additional fundraising needs
- ▶ In December and through the Winter, we will provide various opportunities for parishioners to donate to this project
- Our intent is to complete construction in the summer of 2014:
 - ▶ the 10th anniversary of moving into our new church building
 - the 20th anniversary of the dedication of St. Paul's Memorial Garden

Financing the project

- Reserving a niche (for one-to-two people) initially will be \$2,000. This amount may increase after our initial fundraising period
- ▶ We hope to have 30 to 50 niches reserved
 - Reservations will play a large part in making this dream a reality!
- There will be opportunities to sponsor items in the plan, such as:
 - Benches
 - Cross
 - Red-bud trees and other landscaping
- Plaques for the Remembrance Wall can be purchased for \$300
- Parishioners can also make tax deductible donations to the project
